Updates and Happenings

The **First Annual Red Bank Mayor's Charity Ball** was a big success! The sold-out affair was held on May 1 in support of the **Red Bank Public Library** and the **Parker Clinic.** Not only was the Library a beneficiary but Gerry Eisner, whose family donated the Library's beautiful building to our town, was an honoree of the event, receiving the Historical Legacy Award. In total, \$26,000 was raised that evening! The Red Bank Public Library received its \$13,000 share at the Borough Council Meeting on June 24. The Board of Trustees along with the Library's staff and patrons are grateful to the citizens of the greater Red Bank area and the local business community whose generous support will benefit the Library greatly.

Project Write Now, a local organization dedicated to helping people of all ages become better writers, has partnered with the Library to continue the Oral History Project which began last summer. Teenage interns trained for several days with the instructors at Project Write Now in order to conduct meaningful interviews with elderly residents of our area and to preserve their memories on paper in a compelling way. The Library is providing a comfortable space for the interactions to take place and will store the interviews with accompanying photographs and artifacts in the Local History Room. A celebration of this collaboration, now called "The Interview Project" will take place on Monday, August 24 in the Library's Meeting Room from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. The writers will introduce their subjects and their finished projects will be showcased. Refreshments will be served, and the event will be open to anyone interested in meeting these special seniors and learning more about the history of this place we call home.

National Night Out Against Crime is an annual event that promotes police-community partnerships and is held throughout the country on the first Tuesday of August. Our friendly staff looks forward to participating every year and engaging with the community outside of the Library. The Red Bank Police Department will host the event including a free cookout from 6:00 - 9:00 p.m. in the municipal parking lot on Tuesday, August 4th. Back to High School ~ by Lisa





It was the Eisner family's intent to have the Library serve the role of museum as well as library, and we are very proud of our New Jersey History Collection of archival materials, including artifacts, post-cards, yearbooks, oral histories, and an extensive and diverse array of historical photographs. Director Elizabeth McDermott has long been the guiding force behind the support and promotion of this collection as a museum, research center, and repository of Red Bank history.

Due to budget constraints, the physical contents of the New Jersey History Room have become some-

what inaccessible, so we have found ways to provide virtual access via digitization. Our goal is to digitize items that are visually appealing and to which patrons feel a personal connection. Last year our Director initiated the plan to work with Innovative Document Imaging (IDI) to digitize a number of Red Bank Regional High School (RBRHS) yearbooks from our local history collection. With the support of our administration and funding from our Friends organization, we were able to submit to IDI a total of 41 books spanning the period from 1922 to 1980. This range of materials was selected in order to engage active members of the RBRHS alumni association and include some of our older, more fragile materials. As a result, the books are now available to peruse via our website at www.redbanklibrary.org. Also available in enhanced format is the *Red Bank Register* from 1878-1991. We plan to digitize other items that strongly connect with patrons, including more yearbooks, historical images of Red Bank, and personal photographs. With both time and money in limited supply, we see digitization as a cost-effective tool to make our collections easily discoverable and accessible to our patrons wherever they may be. Let us know what you think about this digital trend. What would you like to see next?

Harry Greenwood's Legacy - by Elizabeth McDermott, Director

Henry Irving "Harry" Greenwood was born August 11, 1920, and died November 27, 2014. Harry graduated from Red Bank High School in 1938. He was the Assistant Editor of *The Log,* the school yearbook, and also one of two Staff Historians. Harry spent much of his life donating his time and energies to nonprofits like the Salvation Army and the Red Bank YMCA.



I think it was serendipity that Harry and I met and became fast friends. Our mutual love of history and of Red Bank gave us much in common. Harry was a long time member of the Red Bank Lions Club and also treasurer. When Harry learned that the New Jersey History Room at the Library needed funds, he gathered the other "Lions of Red Bank" and organized the first of several donations from this 95 year old Red Bank organization. I think this generosity got the attention of other donors because the next year an anonymous donor gave stock to the Friends of the Red Bank Public Library, specifically to support the History Room.

Harry, along with Dan Dorn, Jr., was the first Red Banker to be interviewed for our ongoing oral history efforts. (This two hour interview is available on http://www.njdigitalhighway.org/). Harry also stayed involved in Library events, attending programs along with friend and Red Bank Lion member, Cy Sidun. Harry Greenwood was inducted into the 2005 RBR Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame and was also a key member of his Class of 1938 reunion committee.

As a result of these generous donations, we were able to digitize 41 Red Bank High School yearbooks which are now available to search from our website. I think Harry would be very pleased to know that he made this project possible.

To achieve this, Innovative Digital Imaging (IDI) picked up, digitized and returned our yearbooks to everyone's delight. Digital Memory Media, a subsidiary of IDI, will be on site for personal collections in the fall. See the Friends event below.


