# **Spotlight on a Super Volunteer**

**Sue Goldberg** had been a technology teacher in Short Hills and a Bronx Zoo volunteer for many years when she wandered into the Red Bank Public Library to purchase a library card.

She was attracted by the size of the collection and the building's view. "I've always loved libraries and books. I'd just retired and thought it would be nice to volunteer some time there, as well as borrowing from their collection and looking at the river. It was more than a happy accident when I was accepted into the volunteer corps in Red Bank. Linda Hewitt and Elizabeth McDermott, particularly, have both given me lots of creative assignments, and I couldn't be happier about that."

Besides the regular weekly assignments, Sue has enjoyed assembling displays for the cases as well as putting together signage for special events and displays. "Linda always finds wonderful artists and collectors, so setting up the display cases becomes a delightful task." Some of the displays in the last couple of years include chocolate pots from the collection of Gale Soler, Lisa Bagwell's sculptures made from recycled materials, women in stamps from Elsalyn Palmisano's collection, a number of Glenn Vogel's dug-up

treasures, and fellow volunteer Joan Boucher's "butterflies."

"Some of my favorites include Carl Colmorgen's festive hats which he wears to suit the seasons or the holidays while he crosses school children in Red Bank. I also had a ton of fun setting up (and playing with) the Star Wars collectible figures belonging to librarian Julina Lee's husband. Joanne Grandits, wife of author and Library Board member John Grandits, let us borrow her marionette and puppet collection which filled cases on both floors of the Library. They were both magnificent and adorable!"

And, if a month should arrive without a contributor, Sue has shared her own collections like Native American artifacts, recycled goods and projects, and storybooks with their stuffed animal counterparts. "The Library staff has often collated items from individual homes so we can put together a display. We've shown teapots, decorative boxes, and sea glass, for example."

Volunteering at the Red Bank Library has given me opportunities to be useful and a bit creative. I love it all, whether I'm shelving books, clipping articles for the vertical files, or displaying someone's favorite treasures. It's all good!"

### **Board Member Profile: John Grandits, President**

The printed word has always been a part of my life. My dad was a printer. He ran a jobbing shop in Buffalo, NY. I worked for him from the time I can remember until I got my own job. I learned; paper cutting, printing on a number of presses, engraving, embossing, die-cutting, and sweeping the floor (a job I hated). My favorite was setting type. In those days it was all "hot metal"—individual pieces of type set by hand, or lines of type set with a keyboard on a Linotype machine.

Mom ran a college bookstore for decades. Our house was filled with art and literature textbooks that for one reason or another didn't sell.

Joanne Grandits, my wife, came out of the world of editing to become a Children's Librarian. She's at the Berkley Branch of the Ocean County Library System.

I went to Rochester Institute of Technology to study the printing arts. I quickly found myself most interested in book design. Book designers choose the font, lay out the pages, place the pictures, decide the colors, and plan the binding and jacket. Much of my training was in the field of fine books: hand made paper, hand set types, small presses, and hand binding. But I decided to go into main-stream publishing.

My design career started in scholarly publishing; Oxford University Press, Macmillan College, Open Court Books. These are scientific, mathematics, and philosophy publishers. But soon I was drawn to children's books and magazines.

I was hired to design the first issues of Cricket Magazine. There I learned how to art direct from

the brilliant illustrator Trina Schart Hyman. Later, I designed and art directed at Lothrop Lee & Shepard, Crown Publishing, Random House, Open Court Reading, Muse Magazine, Click Magazine, and Front Street/Cricket Books. Joanne and I were editorial/art team in the start-up of Click Magazine.

Over the years I've had the good fortune to work with children's book luminaries like Hilary Knight, David Weisner, David Macauley, Leo and Diane Dillon, John Steptoe, Thacher Hurd, Mordicai Gerstein, and Faith Ringgold.

Most recently I've been a children's book writer and poet. I have a studio on the third floor of my house (and I'm still sweeping the floor). I'm the author of "The Travel Game," "Ten Rules You Absolutely Must Not Break if You Want to Survive the School Bus," "Technically It's Not My Fault," "Blue Lipstick" and "Pictures Tell Stories" (which is in print but hard to find). 
I've been on the Red Bank Library Board of Trustees since February 2010 and was elected to the presidency this February.



Throckmorton's was a "dealer in lumber, lathe, lime, cement, brick, nails, paints, oils, etc.... One of the best known houses dealing in lumber and masons' materials in the county, " according to an old publication on display in the New Jersey History Room.
