A year full of anniversary events is proving to be popular. On May 20th we will celebrate our "Birth Year" as we recognize 1937 as the year the Eisner Family donated their home to the Borough of Red Bank for use as a Library. In honor of this event we have displays at the Library, the Borough Hall and the County Clerk's building in Freehold where we recognize the wonderful history of Red Bank. Local History Room - Rebirth

In 2014, we closed the New Jersey History Room at the Red Bank Public Library. When we reopen the room for visitors on May 20th it will be named the Local History Room. Over the past couple of years, we confirmed there is significant interest in Red Bank history through the popularity of our Historic Red Bank Facebook page, our Oral History Program, and the Pop Up Museum during the 2014 Sidewalk Sale. So work has continued behind the scenes despite the doors being closed. Thanks to our dedicated volunteers Sue Goldberg & Nancy Tarbell, we were able to grow the collection and keep it relevant to our community. Efforts included: digitizing the Red Bank High School yearbooks dating back to 1922 as well as maps of town from decades ago, archiving historical photos donated by the family of Anthony Trufolo, installing exhibits at the Library and Borough Hall, and more. Most recently the Foundation funded our subscription to Ancestry.com.

Stop in and peruse our unique collection of local directories, photos, memorabilia and exhibits housed on the 2nd Floor of the Library. We are proud to offer a combination of resources and online tools to historians, authors, genealogists and anyone curious about Red Bank's past. The Local History Room will be open on Wednesday afternoons, with additional hours in the near future. We invite you to come and learn something new about your town.

When the Library formally celebrates the 80th Anniversary as the Eisner Memorial Library on Saturday, May 20, there will be a special reason for four select students to celebrate. For the sixth consecutive year, the Friends held a **Bookmark Contest** in which Red Bank children in grades kindergarten through high school were invited to create a design focusing on the theme "I Spy My Favorite Place In Red Bank." These entries were returned to the Library in mid-April and then judged by three local artists — Joe Bergholm, Rosemary Pappa and Nancy Mail. Twelve winning bookmarks were chosen in categories K-2, 3-5, 6-8 and high school. Once again, the Woman's Club of Red Bank supported the contest by funding the printing of the winning bookmarks.




Discover Historic Red Bank Through Walking Tour

This walking tour was the brainchild of our Circulation Supervisor & Outreach Coordinator, Linda Hewitt. She said, "I always thought there should be a walking tour of Red Bank. It's a very historical town. So many people come to visit, to shop and to enjoy cultural events, there should be something to educate them about Red Bank's rich history." Well, now there is! Linda recruited the assistance of our long-time volunteer Kathy Lou Colmorgen who has an encyclopedic knowledge of Red Bank along with past Volunteer of the Year, Sue Goldberg, and devoted patron Barbara Withers. Together, they mapped out a one-hour walking tour including just some of Red Bank's many historic landmarks. They also researched the locations' backgrounds and found historic photographs and documents to enhance the presentation.


The guided tours will depart from the Library on Saturday, May 20 at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Registration is recommended by phone or through our website.

Countdown to Summertime!



The theme for our **2017 Summer Reading Program** is *Build a Better World!* There will be fun reading incentives for kids and teens, and lots of great programs throughout the summer for all age groups. The summer programs will be supported again with funds from the Friends of the Red Bank Public Library.



Last year our Children's Librarian Sira Williams created **Story Walk in Riverside Gardens**. Each week she installed a new story on panels along the pathways of the park. Each panel revealed one more page of the book, and visitors had to complete the walk to finish the story. It was a creative way to promote literacy, exercise and community engagement.

Due to the overwhelming popularity of the Story Walk, Ms. Williams will be expanding the program this summer. A generous donation from the **William Gross Charitable Foundation** will help

fund the installation of permanent Story Walk fixtures in Riverside Gardens in partnership with the **Red Bank Parks & Recreation Department.** The Library will also create Story Walk on Library grounds for the Summer Reading Program.



Youth Volunteer Profile: Peter "PJ" Miraglia



Volunteering is a two-way endeavor — the volunteer must be committed, and the institution must provide an environment that is welcoming and rewarding. Sometimes the perfect combination of personality and challenging work occurs serendipitously to form the perfect match. This was the case with Peter Miraglia and the Red Bank Public Library.

Peter (we still call him PJ) joined our Computer Tutor team in 2011 as a sophomore at Christian Brothers Academy with community service hours to fulfill. He lived in Freehold and was driven each way by his parents, so we assumed that PJ would

finish his hours and move on. However, once Peter started volunteering every third Saturday, he made friends and established a list of "regulars" which meant his tutoring schedule was always full. As time went by, we watched a shy young man blossom as his confidence grew and he participated in more activities at the Library.

After three years of volunteering, Peter left for George Washington University in Washington D.C. While majoring in International Relations, world travel beckoned, and his latest challenge is his semester abroad in Chile. He has been studying at the Pontifical Catholic University of Chile in Santiago since February. He says "Life in Santiago has certainly been a change of pace, and learning to live in a different language took me a few weeks to get accustomed to. Chileans are notorious for speaking "chileno", or the country's dialect of Spanish, which is spoken very fast and includes many "slang" words ... While it proved to be difficult to understand the people of Santiago at first, especially the younger generation, it has been a great experience...I have noticed how Chileans are very welcoming and accepting, but they also do not care much for punctuality!"

Once he returns, Peter will start a summer internship at Morgan Stanley in Baltimore and then his final year at GWU. We are proud of his accomplishments and look forward to hearing about his next adventure!
